





REPAIR WORK ON CCGS TRACY

Last September in Les Méchins, Steven Blaney, the Member of Parliament for Lévis-Bellechasse, announced on behalf of the Honourable Gail Shea, Minister of Fisheries and Oceans Canada, the awarding of a \$6.8-million contract to Groupe Maritime Verreault inc. This funding will provide assistance to Quebec's shipbuilding industry and economic sector.

The CCGS Tracy, a Canadian Coast Guard vessel built in 1968, will undergo a major refit which will extend her service life by another 10 years.

The CCGS *Tracy* is a medium-endurance buoy tender with a shallow draught that measures 55.32 metres in length. It has some icebreaking capability and can launch and recover fast response crafts. It is primarily used for the maintenance of aids to navigation, icebreaking, flood control and environmental response.

This investment is part of the \$175 million announced under Canada's Economic Action Plan earmarked for the Canadian Coast Guard.

A NEW DIRECTOR

FOR THE MAGDALEN ISLANDS AREA



On December 1, 2009, a new director was appointed to the DFO's Magdalen Islands Area. Christian Houle has joined the Area's team to continue the work of Roger Simon, who had headed the team for many years.

Backed by extensive management experience acquired while in the public sector with Statistics Canada, Houle successively worked as senior analyst, survey manager, data interpretation workshop manager, chief analysis consultant and editing manager. Moreover, Houle will also be able to draw on the knowledge and experience of his predecessor, Roger Simon, who has accepted to bring Houle up to speed on the sectoral files.

REBUILDING THE LOBSTER FISHERY SHORT-TERM TRANSITIONAL MEASURES

Last June, the Minister of Fisheries and Oceans Canada announced that the Government of Canada agreed to invest \$65 million to help lobster harvesters in Atlantic Canada. This grant was awarded to counter the difficult market conditions that have resulted from the global economic recession. Of this amount, \$15 million will go to establishing the *Short-Term Transitional Measures* (STTM) program.



This exceptional program is intended for lobster licence holders and Aboriginal communities that have been severely affected by the collapse in market demand for lobster caused by the global recession.

To be eligible, lobster harvesters must have:

- held a valid lobster licence for 2008 and 2009;
- earned income from lobster harvesting in 2008 and 2009;
- registered a gross income of no more than \$50,000 from lobster landings in 2009;
- experienced a drop of least 25% in the total value of lobster landed in 2009 compared to 2008 landings;
- an annual income that directly depends on lobster harvesting;
 - a. the value of landed lobster must account for at least 50% of the total value of their landings in 2008;
 - b. the lobster landed in 2009 must have a value of at least \$2,500.

Applicants have until January 31, 2010, to apply for the STTM program. Forms are available at the DFO Regional Office, Area offices and on the program's Web site at www.dfo-mpo.gc.ca/lobster.

ON THE ST. LAWRENCE: INTEGRATING INNOVATIVE TECHNOLOGIES

The first buoys started appearing on the St. Lawrence River at the turn of the 18th century. At that time, the number of ships using this trade corridor was increasing steadily, and, as evidenced by the high rate of shipwrecks, the river showed itself to be a significant challenge to navigation.

In 1962, the Canadian Coast Guard (CCG) was born. One of its mandates was and has been to ensure safe conditions for maritime traffic, while providing effective aids to navigation. Although CCG's mandate has remained the same since its creation, the technologies used to secure the safety of ships have evolved a great deal.

RELIABLE AND ECONOMICAL SYNTHETIC MATERIALS MAKE THE GRADE

The new technologies improving the reliability and availability of its aids to navigation benefit CCG in a number of ways. Today, 69% of all buoys are made of plastic materials, thereby causing a significant decrease in the annual labour needed to paint them, especially in the case of buoys used for recreational navigation.

The modern aids to navigation are also lighter and require more manageable handling equipment, making it easier to install, remove and check on buoys, and do so earlier in the navigation season. Also, the easier handling enables CCG to respond to irregular situations more promptly.

Moreover, almost 70% of light buoys are now equipped with Light Emitting Diode (LED) lights, which consume less energy than conventional lights. These LED lanterns have permanent solar panels to recharge their batteries. This solution is at once ecological and economical as it reduces the use of non-rechargeable batteries, which are expensive to dispose of since they have to be sent to special waste management sites.

Needless to say, these synthetic buoys adequately meet CCG's safety standards and address its economic and environmental concerns.



The changes don't end there: The various newsletter sections, such as Dispatches, New Publications and Convictions, are easier to spot and the archives of issues published in the last four years are available online.




Two new publications can now be viewed on the St. Lawrence Plan, For a Sustainable Development Web site.
